### 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

The management has taken initiatives to implement MIS for the complete automation of the system. The accounts, library has automated and steps are taken to automate students admission and attendance details. The college has its own website, teaching notes portal, online tutorial blogs etc. The Mahatma Gandhi university has Implemented MIS (Single window system for registration, communications, examinations, results etc) that increases the efficiency of the MG university as well as all affiliated colleges.

- KSCSTE funded student research projects.

### 6.3 .3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

#### **Examination and Evaluation**

The college follow the direction of University in conducting the examinations. All the courses are CBCSS and follows the ratio of 1:3 for Internal and external evaluation.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

The Institution has a **research committee** which is actively engaged in the propagation of research culture in the institution. The committee provides a platform for research paper presentations for the in house faculty members and students and also encourages faculty from outside colleges. Research paper presentations of PG students and faculty are frequently held. The papers recommended by the expert committee are published in the biannual multidisciplinary journal FORTIS with ISSN.

Sixteen research papers published by our faculty members in peer reviewed national and international journals.

There are 3 ongoing Minor Research Projects in the College.

Ms Ally C Antony, (Department of Bioscience) Ms Raphika P M and Ms Jasmine P M (Department of Electronics) is pursuing research under FIP. At present seven teachers are doing part time PhD.

Five KSCSTE funded student projects has been sanctioned to the students of Biosciences department.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and Physical infrastructure and instrumentation

The College library has a library advisory committee and this year the committee recommended for new collection of books and those books were purchased. Library offers access to internet to staff and students and also subscribes to journals and magazines.

The General Library is located in a double stored independent building of 5200 sq. feet constructed in front part of the college campus, The Library is fully computerized allowing functions like issue, return, OPAC search, and availability assessment of books, easy and user friendly. We have bar-coded our document collections.

Library enables the staff and students to subscribe UGC-NLIST journal repository.

Various ICT resources like websites, blogs and almost 20 classrooms were equipped with LCD projectors. The campus has enabled Wi-Fi connectivity.

The physical infrastructure of the college is utilised optimally and maintenance has been done periodically. The infrastructure of the college includes fully equipped conference hall, Electronics, Computer, Biosciences laboratories, Language lab. Play ground, Basket ball court and health club is also maintained periodically and ensured its quality for adequate utilisation.

### 6.3.6 Human resource management

The responsibilities and charges of various clubs and activities are divided among the staff members in the opening day of the academic year.

Management and Principal explain the prospective plan of the institution. A plan of action is made by the departments based on the discussions in the IQAC, Head of the departments and staff council.

Faculty development programmes and training sessions are conducted for the staff.

The staff of the college celebrate important festivals like "Onam", Christmas and "Bakrid" to strengthen the togetherness and harmony of the community. A staff day at the end of the academic year is celebrated every year.

A "Best performing teacher" and "Best performing non-teaching staff" award is constituted and which has been distributed every year to motivate the staff. Incentives are given to teachers who take in service PhD and publish papers in top tired journals.

Teachers with international recognition, distinction in curricular and extra curricular achievements are honoured in public meeting.

### 6.3.7 Faculty and staff recruitment

The faculty and staff recruitment is strictly based on UGC, Mahatma Gandhi University and Kerala government norms.

### 6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Majority of the departments in the college take initiative to interact and collaborate to undergo their projects, internships and on the job trainings.

The association inauguration of commerce and Business administration regularly invite CEOs from Industry. Mr Kochousep Chittilappally, Managing director of V Guard industry was present in the commerce association inauguration.

The Department of Electronics in collaboration with Institute of Electronics and Telecom Engineers formed an IETE students' forum. 57 students took membership in the forum

The Department of Biosciences collaborates with CSIR and DBT supported research institutes for the summer research projects of students.

#### 6.3.9 Admission of students

The admission of the students is conducted as central allotment process by the MG University. The reservation policy of Kerala government is followed in admissions.

Fifty percent of the admission to the self financing courses is conducted by the management as per the Kerala government norms.
