CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

M E S College Marampally, being an affiliated college, follows the syllabi prescribed by Mahatma Gandhi University. The staff council prepares an Academic Calendar in line with the University Calendar that meticulously schedules the activities for the year. Teachers frame Teaching Schedule and Teaching Plan to ensure effective curriculum delivery. The Core Monitoring Committee of IQAC conducts Internal Audit in all the departments at the end of an academic year and provides feedback reports on the strengths, weaknesses and the thrust areas to zero in on the next academic year. The departments prepare Action Plan based on the feedback received from IQAC. Master timetable is prepared at the beginning of the academic year to help teaching and learning processes function smoothly. Orientation Programmes for the newly enrolled students are conducted. The departments provide Certificate Courses (CC), to help students equip additional skills and enhance communicative prowess. The college is a Local Chapter of NPTEL and students can undergo various CCs. Students can also undergo featured Spoken Tutorials provided by IIT Mumbai. Funded Conferences/Seminars are organized. Students attend/present papers in International/National Conferences and publish papers in UGC listed journals. KSCSTE funded student projects, Mini Projects by the Electronics students and Case studies by Psychology students are conducted. The college has a unique Inter Disciplinary Resource Sharing program for PG students to promote knowledge sharing and enrichment. The Internal examination Cell schedules and carry out internal examinations in centralized manner. Department wise mark lists are then submitted to the Principal for review and class wise PTA

meetings are scheduled to inform the progress of students. College has comprehensive administration software (TCS, Total Campus Solution) to coordinate various academic activities. Majority of the classrooms and Conference Auditoriums are digitally smart. The library is well stocked with books, magazines, journals and provides access to N-LIST, online journals and free internet connectivity. PTA funded Book Bank is available for financially backward students. The College also has a well-equipped Language Lab and e-content development Studio. DST-FIST funded Science Laboratories ensure academic research programs are carried out uninterrupted. To tap the potential of advanced learners, career orientation programmes, visits to industries and prestigious academic institutions are provided under the Government funded WWS (Walk with a Scholar) program. To lift the academic level and ensure overall development of slow learners, Government funded Scholar Support Programme (SSP) and PTA funded Remedial Coaching are provided. Alumni powered academic programmes like Campus to Corporate, is regularly conducted. For advanced practical experience in real time environment, students are allowed to take up OJT/Field Projects in reputed institutions. College Counseling Centre and Mentors always take of the mental health of students and provide them psychological assistance if necessary. During the Tutorial Hour, teachers engage classes in inter disciplinary manner to give students a taste of other disciplines, allowing them to get certifications while doing so. Government of Kerala funded Additional Skill Acquisition Programme (ASAP) is offered.

1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

Feedback Obtained

The College regularly upgrades its standards and benchmarks with an understanding its responsibility towards the students to nurture global competencies among them. The curriculum offered by the institution stringently adheres to Mahatma Gandhi University and the updating of curriculum in the concerned subjects are ensured by placing the suggestions in appropriate platforms. Structured feedback on curriculum is collected from different stakeholders such as Students, Alumni, Parents, Employers and Teachers with regard to this. Feedback focusses on the aspects of employability of the courses, updation of syllabus, quality of teaching and various practices of accompaniments.

- Student Feedback - A general feedback is collected from all the students at the end of every semester on a five point scale. Out of the 20 questions, five are related to curriculum. IQAC analyzes the feedback received and any important finding will be informed to the concerned teacher to address it. The analysis of the feedback obtained in 2018-19 has been found that the score is above four in the five point scale.
- Teacher Feedback - IQAC collects feedback on curriculum and its associated aspects from each faculty member at the end of every semester along with Academic Monitoring format. The questionnaire consists of 8 Likert style and three descriptive type questions.
- Alumni Feedback - Alumni coordinator collects feedback during the Annual general body meeting. The questionnaire consists of six Likert questions and one descriptive question. Alumni feedback web link is provided in the Institutional website also.
- Parents' Feedback - Feedback is collected from the parents during PTA general body meeting. Out of the fourteen questions, seven are related to curriculum. It has been found that more than 70 of parents are satisfied with the curriculum analyzed for 2018-19.
- Employer Feedback- Employer feedback is collected at department level. Departments collect feedback from the companies in which their students are working and the Internships are carried out. The collected feedback is analyzed for maintaining quality benchmarks in curriculum and the institution ensures infrastructural and other academic supports to enrich the curriculum provided by the affiliated University. It has been found in the student feedback that the technology utilized learning instructions shall be improved and this has been addressed by establishing E-content facility in the campus and similarly orienting the faculty members by giving training to them. Teachers raised the issue of non availability of sufficient reference books during year on which revised syllabus has been addressed procuring the prescribed text books in the library. Four of our teachers are members of the Board of Studies of Mahatma Gandhi University and majority of the teachers have actively involved in syllabus revision workshops. The consolidated report prepared based on the feedback from all stakeholders are discussed during the syllabus revision and essential modifications are made to construct a progressive and updated syllabus.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The institution has a dedicated two hours per week (3.30 pm – 4.30 pm on all Mondays and Wednesdays) tutorial/mentoring system. Students were divided into small groups in each class and a tutor was assigned to each group. (Average tutor student ratio is 1: 19). For each class two or three tutors have been assigned according to the students' strength. Tutors shall interact with each student personally and collect their academic and extra-curricular needs. Based on this, tutors arrange remedial classes and pay personal attention to academically weak students. Similarly, advanced learners are channelized to various platforms to achieve their career goals. A Bio-data Book for each student has been kept by the tutor which consists of the academic, personal and co-curricular details. Thus the tutorial system helps the students equip themselves to achieve career goals and also provides a platform for psycho social counseling. A counseling centre, MES Counseling Center (MMCC) is also functioning in the campus with the vision of addressing the needs and problems of MES community at their intra personal, interpersonal and social levels in attaining mental health. The Principal Counselor of MMCC is Dr. K.E. Leelamma, Retd. Associate Professor and HOD, Union Christian College, Aluva.

The students are selected during the tutor interaction and send to the counseling support. Major problems identified were lack of motivation, not interested in academic activities, memory problem, personal problems, and learning disability. Three departments arranged classes for their students. The topics dealt were Study Habits, Mental Health and Motivation. Five external clients came for counselling. All Departments arrange certificate courses and the classes were conducted during these tutorial hours. The tutorial system also focuses on the development of soft skills, managerial skills and practical skills of the students. For the final year UG students career guidance classes and competitive examination coaching were provided. Group discussion, seminar presentations, quiz competitions and mini project development were also conducted during these hours and many students got benefited. Many of the students got placement offers from various companies and many others got admission to PG in prestigious institutions. The mentoring also helped to inculcate high degree of social consciousness and human values in students. During these hours legal awareness classes, skill development programs and counseling were given. "Knowledge Sharing Programmes" conducted in the PG departments during the tutorial hours to enable the students to understand interdisciplinary knowledge with regard to their course of study. This system gave academic and personal support to the students and directly improved the students' success rate both academically and socially. A consolidated tutorial hour report at Department level is collected and documented. A faculty coordinator has been assigned to coordinate the tutorial hours.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Being an affiliated College, the institution scrupulously follows the evaluation system implemented by the University. The evaluation reforms made by the University are communicated to the College prior to its implementation. The reforms initiated and practiced by the Institution are in accordance with those introduced by the University. The major components that sum up the reforms in CIE at the institutional level are described below. Academic Calendar: The College prepares an Academic calendar according to the University calendar which is ratified by the Staff Council and implemented by HODs. In the beginning of an academic year the calendar is distributed among the students. The complete regulations regarding CIE including examination pattern and evaluation criteria are published in Academic calendar and College website. Internal Examination Cell: The internal examination cell is responsible for the proper conduct of internal examinations in the college. Two internal assessments are held centrally in every semester. IEC is responsible for scheduling, collecting question papers, preparing invigilation roasters and making seating arrangements. Also IEC ensures the question papers are set in

accordance with University examination pattern. Valuation Feedback: The answer sheets are valued within one week after the examinations. Corrected scripts are discussed individually with students to get their feedbacks. The scripts are then kept in concerned departments till the end of the semester, to address any issues that might arise in future. Supplementary test: Students are given opportunity to appear for supplementary examinations if they couldn't attend the test. Chances are also given for bettering their scores in internal examinations Assignment/Attendance: Proper weightages has to be allocated for assignments and attendance. Attendance and assignments are evaluated for each student and marks are awarded as per University guidelines. Monthly attendance statements are prepared and published for informing students. Seminars/Viva Voce: Seminars and viva voce are also considered in preparing internal marks for UG students. Tutorial system: The institution has a dedicated tutorial hour every week with an objective of providing psycho social support to the students. A one-to-one discussion is facilitated by the tutor guide the students in curricular and co-curricular activities based on the skill sets. Remedial measures are recommended to slow learners. A Bio data book is maintained by the tutor to record the curricular and co-curricular activities of the students. Parents meeting are convened at department level to review the progress of the students' performance. Appropriate support mechanisms are suggested to parents by the tutor in the meeting. Uploading to online Portal: The internal marks and attendance details are uploaded timely in the college portal tcs.mesmarampally.org. Students and parents have login rights and can access the relevant information. Uploading to University Portal: The tutors prepare the internal grade sheets and the Grading and restructuring coordinator finally uploads the internal marks into the University portal. IQAC Academic Audit: The IQAC Cell of the college conducts an academic audit and provides feedback at the end of each semester to ensure that departments are following the academic calendar without flaws.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The institution has an efficiently functioning system in place to ensure that it adheres to the academic calendar. Staff council presided by the Principal, HODs and three elected members are responsible for scheduling and coordinating academic activities in the college. The academic calendar is planned and scheduled by the Staff Council in consultation with IQAC. Individual departments prepare an action plan for the academic year based on the calendar. Head of the Departments, Tutors and Teachers will implement the calendar and prepare teaching schedule and teaching plan. Internal Quality Assurance Cell consolidates the curricular and extracurricular activities based on the action plan submitted by the Departments. A team of faculty members with a coordinator is entrusted to conduct the internal examination centrally. Academic Calendar in accord with University Calendar: The College has an Academic calendar and handbook ratified by the staff council and implemented by HODs which is totally in accord with the University calendar. The University examination schedules are announced in the beginning of an academic year, and the calendar handbook is distributed among the students. All the co-curricular and extracurricular activities conducted in college are ensured to be in line with University Calendar. Internal Examination Cell (IEC): The Internal Examination Cell is responsible for the proper conduct of internal examinations in the college. Two internal assessments are held centrally in every semester. IEC conducts these internal examinations such that the portions are covered completely before University examinations. Result Publishing: Internal examination results are published within a weeks' time. The consolidated results are prepared by the tutor and it is announced to the students. Examination related grievances are addressed promptly and the marks are uploaded to University portal timely. Uploading to online Portal: The internal marks and attendance details are

uploaded timely in the college portal tcs.mesmarampally.org. Students and parents have login rights and can access the relevant information. IQAC Academic Audit: The IQAC Cell of the College conducts an academic audit and provides feedback at the end of each semester to ensure that the departments are following the academic calendar properly. A teacher feedback is also collected at the end of every semester to improve the teaching learning process. Cross verification: The criteria as per University regulations to calculate internal marks are informed to the students. The students can independently calculate their marks and cross verify it with the subject teacher's assessment. Since the assessment is performed in quantitative manner, chances of error are minimum. The students are given answer scripts for review. Similarly, internal grade sheets are given to the students for verification and signature is obtained before the upload into University web portal. The marks are also entered in the Bio-data book provided to the Tutor. Clubs/Cells: The clubs/cells that ensure various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities carried out in an efficient and time bound manner in accordance with academic calendar.

4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

A system of procedures has evolved over the years for the maintenance and optimal utilization of infrastructure. A subcommittee is constituted for infrastructure maintenance and regularly holds consultation with College Planning Forum constituted of the Principal, IQAC Coordinator, Office Superintendent and senior faculty members. Rules and regulations of the labs and library are displayed and given in the College website and calendar. Campus supervisor assisted by support staff is in charge of campus maintenance. Class rooms and campus cleanliness, campus maintenance are ensured by the support staff. Security staff provides safety to the students. The lab assistants

maintain the labs and periodically check the lab equipments and facilities. A Stock and Maintenance register kept in all the labs are verified by the Heads of the departments and the Principal. Annual maintenance contract ensures the upkeep of important equipment. UPS is provided to power sensitive equipment and computers. Air-conditioner is provided for sensitive installations. The optimum utilization of the lab is ensured by providing additional lab hours for student projects, water analysis tests and research activities. Lab is also used for giving On the Job training to vocational higher secondary students and for conduct of workshops to students and teachers. IT resources are supported by UPS/automatic switch over generators. Solar panels have been installed to support computer labs. A network resource center is available for the students to facilitate reprography and internet access. Network administrator is in charge of ERP software, website, computer maintenance and camera surveillance. Computers are monitored by the technical assistants and sensitive computers are provided anti-virus software. Design of brochures, banners and Newsletters are made by the faculty in charge and students. A digital version of a book for the migrant literacy programme was made by the B.Voc Animation and Graphics Department. Electronics Department developed a mobile app for teaching learning process and the students are taking pictures using the SLR camera which helps the documentation of the programme of the college. IT resources are used for film screening and review. Public address system of the college is used by the students to form "MES Rhythms Radio" club. Library is fully automated. It hosts a separate website, Walk-ins and Log in registers are kept. Stock verification is carried out every year. Sports amenities are maintained by the support staff. Time is allotted for the students to use the Health club. Hostel facility is provided to the students in sports quota in association with Kerala Sports council. College Play ground is available for championships and for the public and neighbouring schools on request. The school students of neighborhood are given training in yoga and martial arts. Auditorium, Seminar and Conference Hall are extensively used for the conduct of academic and cultural programmes. Committees are set up to improve the efficiency of the Canteen, college buses and Hostel. Water purification plant, sanitary pad vending machines and incinerators are routinely serviced. Biogas plants manage Solid waste disposal.

The institution has an effective strategy for delegating authority and providing operational autonomy to all academic departments, clubs and associations to work towards decentralized governance. The institution promotes participative management by involving the staff and students in various activities and clubs. Case Study 1 Participation in University Arts Festival

Education should impart not just academic knowledge, but also ensure overall development of students. The participation of students in cultural events at University level was found less before 2013. Thus, to envisage Vision 2020, the Management formulated a strategy to enhance co-curricular participation in University level Competitions. Every year, toppers of various arts events in the college competitions are selected for participating in University Arts festival. The Principal meets with the Staff and student coordinators of art events and the decisions taken are reviewed further by the Management. Adequate feedback from the Student's union is always taken into account in decision making. Trainers of various cultural events are arranged for practicing group events. Staff coordinators and faculty are assigned duties for each group event. The substantial financial backing from the Management and PTA is crucial for effective implementation. The college has now attained a remarkable position in University level Youth festival. These successes are always the result of unity and participation of whole team of MES College Marampally. Case Study 2 PRAGATHI : Reaching the Unreachable MES College Marampally is positioned in a rural panchayath, where the majority population is semi-literate and the inhabitants are mainly daily wage earners from financially and socially marginalized communities. The College is a regular benefactor of Government UP School, Vazhakkulam for the past five years, where the wards of these marginalized groups are studying. Being a higher educational institution, the college owes a responsibility towards the community it belongs. Extending the community service activities, the college has initiated a programme titled PRAGATHI in which the students of North Vazhakulam Government UP school is supported by being provided study materials and school stationery like school uniforms, bags, boxes, notebooks, and umbrellas at the beginning of every academic year. Over the years the activities have evolved into an exclusive charitable body of the college under the banner PRAGATHI. The programme is executed in a triangular partnership method, with the expenses for buying the study materials met by students, teachers and Management. At the beginning of every academic year, PRAGATHI Coordinator calls a meeting of all the heads of the departments and student representatives of all classes to collect funds for the charity drive. Class tutors aided by class representatives take initiative in collecting the fund. The College Management and staff take special interest in pooling funds for this extension activity. The students play a vital role in the implementation of this activity. With PRAGATHI, the college is able to inculcate the value of service to humanity among its students. On an average, 225 students of North Vazhakulam Government U.P. School are getting benefited and the college spends an average amount of Rs. 20,000 every year.

Best Practice: I Title of Best Practice: Eco friendly Activities Goal The institution is upholding environmental consciousness and values and thereby to inculcate these values in mind of students and thus to create an environmentally responsible citizens. The Context The campus, spread out in a hilly stretch surrounded by lush greenery, is a sure sight of delight for a lover of nature. The college is also in close vicinity to the river Periyar and

very near to the city of Kochi and the International Airport, Nedumbassery, Kochi. With around 2200 students and 200 staff members, there needs measures and practices to integrate with nature and the impact on the nature can be severe if its waste disposals, recycling etc. is not properly managed. The college assumes responsibility and commitment to keep the ecological balance intact. The Practice The College follows a code for environmental protection and every department in the college follows the code within their constraints. There is a Green Office at the heart of its campus to make it an inspiring and 100 sustainable place to work and study. As an initiative towards paperless office, College carries on its student and faculty related records and reports using Total Campus Solutions (TCS) for office automation. The institution greatly depends on ICT practices thereby reducing the usage of papers, printing is strictly limited to necessary and unavoidable situations with optimal use of papers. The eco friendly activities also include sustainability practices in all facets of the programs organized by the institution, processes in the institution and student experiences. The college library is computerized with OPAC system. Various measures as Green audit reports, Energy audit Solar panels, vermicomposting unit, biogas plant, Expenditure on green campus, organic farming, rain harvesting structures, eco-friendly sign boards, 'Shanthistal', massive replacement of light bulbs with more efficient LED lighting are major practices. Building and refurbishing to high environmental standards, saving energy, reducing waste and improving health and wellbeing is not only within the pillars of the institution. It has reach to the local community in terms of workshops in Energy saving devices to the local self help group, Cyclothon Campaign and rally, nature camps to vulnerable ecological spots, waste management sessions by experts, cleaning water resources in the locality and recharging water tables by rain pits are major practices adopted for environment and sustainability. Various departments take initiatives in collecting used plastic pens for recycling and creating crafts, Observance and environment sensitisation on various days related to environment like Environment Day, Ozone day, Wetland day etc. to create an awareness among students and people in the locality. Greater measures are adopted to turn the campus into a green zone by planting trees during Alumni Meets, NSS Camps, Festive times of Onam etc. Campus also promotes organic vegetable farming in the college premises with the support of students. 'Santhisthal', a garden which nurtures rare plants and trees is developed and maintained by the college with the support of the Kerala State Biodiversity Board. Evidence of Success ? Problems Encountered and Resources Required: The major problems encountered in the implementation of the programme are a) Financial: Initial investment in the installation of solar panel required a lumpsum amount. Maintenance of green campus requires support staff. b) Procedural: Strenuous process of collection, assorting of wastes and active students' participation is hindered by rigorous schedule of semester system. Best Practice: II Title of Best Practice: Women empowerment Goal The institution aims in promoting girls' education and empowerment making them self-determined and self-reliant. The principle followed is educating a women is educating a family. Objectives • To promote girls education, especially among

students from minority and backward groups. • To prepare girls to face challenges in life by offering career oriented courses and skill development

The Context The institution is located in a rural area and majority of the students are girls from minority sections of the society. The greatest challenge institution faces is the dropout rate of girls students owing to marriage and other familial responsibilities. College is taking greater efforts in creating an awareness on the need of education and career in women's life.

The Practice A separate cell for Women functions in the college that caters to the needs and issues related to the girl students of the college. The Women's Cell has a faculty coordinator and student representatives. It regularly organizes various programmes for skill development, gender sensitization, legal awareness, domestic violence and sessions from experts on women hygiene and health. There is a tailoring unit and an instructor in the College and students are given training. Girls are given equal participation in various bodies of the institution as Union, quality Circle, Nature club, NCC, NSS, Red Cross, other cells and clubs in the college. They assume key roles in various College bodies which instils in them leadership qualities and participative decision making. Self-defence and legal awareness classes are organised for girl students to boost their confidence and to live with self esteem. Equal opportunity and zero discrimination on the basis of gender is ensured in campus. Special sessions are given by the college counsellor for girls exclusively to discuss and find solution to any problems they face. To protect their privacy and avoid hesitation of girl students to approach and make use of counselling services, the counsellor of the college is a Lady. There are separate rest rooms, comfort zones and Hostels for girls in the college premises. There is 24x7 security and CCTV surveillance across the campus primarily for the safety and security of the students. It is also interesting to note that the lion's share of staff of the college are Women. Girls students are financially supported by special scholarship schemes instituted by central and state governments. College management also supports girl students in their studies by providing scholarship and freeships. Evidence of Success ? With the organizational support as scholarship, empowerment of the female students have considerably increased. ? Sports Hostel for Women in the campus and provision for training and support in sports activities. ? Pre-marital counselling Centre is set up funded by the Kerala Minority Welfare Department. ? Equal representation of Women in academic and administrative bodies ? Greater success or pass rate among girl students, with many of them bagging prestigious university ranks. ? Entrepreneurial training and sessions ? During placement programs, there's steady rise in the number of girls getting placed in various placements. Problems Encountered and Resources Required The major problems encountered in the implementation of the programme are: a) Financial responsibility in conducting workshops and providing scholarships. b) Constraints related to making the students take up formal employment/entrepreneurship sometimes hindered by marriage and psycho social reasons.

College had taken several activities to empower girl students and make them self-reliant. The vision 2020 of our college mainly emphasizes on women empowerment activities. For ensuring gender equality and participation, inclusion of one girl student is assured in every cell and committees that functions in the college. Women Cell organizes seminars, workshops on Gender sensitization and legal awareness. Other important activities include tailoring classes, training in artificial flower making, Embroidery workshops, conducting health and hygienic awareness classes, self defence classes. Women Cell take initiatives to visit Orphanage and old age homes. College gives priority for admission to girls in management quota. Also special scholarships are provided to girl students. It is evidenced in that women students show greater academic excellence and bagged top positions in University examinations. "Swapna Veedu" (Home for your friend), is the plan co-ordinated to implement the core value of the College. Women students are given preferences for availing benefits of this project. There is separate Girls Hostel facility inside the campus ensuring with 24 hour security and CCTV surveillance system. Kerala State Sports Council allotted Sports Hostel facility in Wrestling and Basket Ball for improving the performance of the students in the respective events. Special Coaching is given for events like Taekwondo, Ju-Jitsu, Wrestling, Judo, Kurash martial arts, Kho Kho etc. Our female students have brought laurels at National and International levels., providing them with Diet allowance, sports kit etc. The Female students had conducted Self defence and training programs in various colleges and schools. Apart from Academic endeavours, co curricular and extracurricular activities are importance for improving confidence, self esteem and team work. The college promotes cultural events and offers training for Group dance, Oppana, Thiruvathira etc. for participation in University Youth festival for which students have bagged awards. Other facilities include Day Care Facility, prayer room, rest room, Sanitary napkin vending machines, Incinerator, personal counseling facility for female students. A Premarital counseling Centre funded by the Kerala Minority Welfare Department, Government of Kerala has been established in this academic year.
